

How to Claim a New British Record

a) A British Record can only be set at:-

i) a Divisional Level or higher contest that has been registered for drug-testing purposes with the GBPF, or

ii) a recognised event abroad organised under the auspices of the IPF.

b) At a Divisional Level contest, fill in a Referees' Certificate (obtainable from most good referees!) and get the referees for the class to sign it. Send it to the Records' Registrar (i.e. me!) within 48 hours. Include an 80p stamp if you want a certificate.

c) At a National Championship, get a Referees' Certificate anyway, plus make sure the MC marks it on the score-sheet, and remind him to get it signed and to send it to the Records' Registrar within 48 hours. Again, send an 80p stamp if you want a certificate.

d) At an international, the GBPF appointed team manager should make the claim on your behalf, but they sometimes forget! Again, it's best to get a Referees' Certificate. If you cannot get it signed, send it in anyway within 48 hours of your return, signed "pp" by the team manager. The record will stay as "pending" until the results are published.

e) "Unequipped" Records can only be claimed from Unequipped Competitions, NOT simply lifting unequipped in a 'normal' event!

Note:-

To claim a Powerlifting record, you must make a total in the contest!

So, if you break a Squat record, don't bomb on the Bench Press!

Please note:-

If your record is not allowed because your division did not register the contest for drug testing, then blame your division, not the Records' Registrar!
